



Del Cranford Elected Board President of National Cooperative Finance Corporation

The Board of Directors of National

Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corp. (CFC) recently elected Delbert Cranford as President at the 2012 CFC Annual Meeting. Mr. Cranford has served on the CFC board since 2007 and as the Vice President of CFC since 2011.

Mr. Cranford has served as a board director of Randolph EMC since 1989, serving as president from 1995 to 2002 and vice president from 1994 to 1995.

Tips for Easy Heat nservation **Pump Maintenance**

Like all heating and cooling systems, proper maintenance remains the key to efficient heat pump operation. The difference in electric use between a well-maintained heat pump and a severely neglected one ranges from 10 percent to 25 percent! Here are five tips for maintaining your heat pump:

- Remember not to set back a heat pump's thermostat if it causes any backup heating system to kick on; they are usually more expensive to operate.
- Clean or change filters once a month or as needed, and maintain the system according to manufacturer's instructions. Dirty filters, coils, and fans reduce airflow, which will decrease system performance and possibly damage the compressor.
- Clean outdoor coils whenever they appear dirty; occasionally, turn off power to the fan and clean it; remove vegetation and clutter from around the outdoor unit.
- Clean the supply and return registers within your home, and straighten their fins if bent.
- Have a professional service your heat pump at least every year. Technicians generally inspect the unit, verify proper performance, and diagnose and repair problems.

Got a New Portable Generator? Read This First!



I bought a new generator so that I'd be prepared for the next power outage. Is there anything special I should know about installing it?

Randolph Electric strongly recommends that a licensed electrician install home generators to ensure they meet all local electrical codes. Also, make sure your generator is properly grounded in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.

Do not connect generators directly to the household wiring unless an appropriate transfer switch has been installed by a licensed, qualified electrician. **Without** the proper transfer switch, power provided by the generator can "backfeed" along the power lines, creating a significant electrocution hazard for anyone coming in contact with the lines, including lineworkers making necessary repairs.

Never operate a generator inside your home or in any other enclosed—or even partially enclosed—area. Generators very quickly produce carbon monoxide, which can easily enter your home. You should have at least one battery-operated or battery-backup carbon monoxide alarm in your home and test it before using your generator.

The best place for a generator is on a dry surface under an open, canopy-like structure. Do not operate it in wet conditions or where there is standing water.

The annual meeting is also a good time to get together with old friends, and is a chance to establish new friendships from other parts of the Randolph EMC cooperative family.

Your cooperative's electric distribution system covers over 1,500 square miles of area in five counties. It stretches from Mt. Gilead to Snow Camp, from Badin Lake to Goldston, and from Randleman to Pinehurst. Annually, for the last 73 years, members from across Randolph EMC's service territory have converged to conduct the business of the cooperative. This is a tradition that should continue and grow even stronger in the future.

The annual meeting is not all business, though. There will be music for your enjoyment, homemade ice cream and lots of information about conservation and energy efficiency to help you save on your electric bill.
