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#### **Be Energy Efficient**

Between holiday houseguests and shorter, colder days, electric bills tend to climb in the winter. Simple steps toward an energy efficient home will help you reduce energy usage costs:

- Set thermostats to the lowest comfortable level. We suggest 68 degrees.
- Use space heaters sparingly—they can use significant amounts of electricity.
- Open curtains on south-facing windows to let in the sun's heat.
- Make sure your vents are not blocked by rugs, furniture, or doors to keep HVAC systems from working harder.

#### **FlexPay**

Our "pay as you go" program lets you purchase electricity in any amount you choose with no due dates or late fees. You can pay online, by phone, or in our office using debit/credit cards, check, or cash. Receive account updates by your choice of text message, phone call, or email. You can also monitor your FlexPay account at MyUsage.com.

#### **Budget Billing**

This plan equalizes your payments for eleven months. In the twelfth month, your account is "evened up" with a final payment or credit applied. Combine this with bank draft for even more convenience.

Remember, if you fall short of being able to make your payment on time, call us before your account becomes subject to disconnection. We can work with you make a payment arrangement and avoid additional costs.

# AVARE a word about Randolph Electric

### Dear Members,

Over the last year, I have written several times about new regulations being proposed by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). These proposed regulations will significantly reduce the likelihood of new coal-fired generating plants being constructed and result in many existing coal plants being shut down.

Randolph EMC and other electric cooperatives from across America are concerned that these regulations will dramatically impact costs for generating electricity. These costs will be realized long after those moving this initiative forward are out of office.

In June, 2013, President Obama announced a series of actions he was taking with the intent to combat climate change. The proposed plan's goal is to reduce the volume of greenhouse gas emissions from electric generation plants that burn fossil fuels—primarily coal. This action is being taken by the Executive Branch, with the Congress being bypassed, as the EPA moves forward to regulate carbon emissions under the Clean Air Act.

This is a two-step approach:
1) Establish targets for any new coal plants that would be constructed; and 2) Establish targets for states to meet to reduce carbon emissions from existing coal plants.

Whether you agree with the President's underlying concerns about global warming or not, the basic fact is that there are no economically viable technologies currently available to effectively capture and store

carbon emissions from new power plants that would be constructed. The proposed new standards are so stringent that coal has basically been eliminated as a fuel source for future electricity generation.

With the stringent regulations targeting existing coal plants, the probability is great that these plants will be shut down or require expensive emissions control equipment be installed. Either way, power bills will rise. For plants that are shut down, new generating plants will need to be constructed in order to deliver reliable power twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

It's very expensive to shut down coal plants before their expected retirement date and build new generation to replace them. It's the same concept as taking the motor out of your car when it's running great and replacing it with a new engine.

Currently, only 13% of Randolph EMC's generation mix is from coal generation, as compared to 36% in 2005. You have already made a significant investment in reducing carbon emissions, but these past efforts are not being recognized under the proposed regulations.

The EPA established a comment period for any interested party to respond with comments or concerns. Your cooperative has been working hard to raise this issue with our members of Congress and to the EPA. To date, Randolph EMC members, Board Directors and employees have made 2,620 responses to the



EPA expressing concerns about the cost impact of these regulations.

Recently, the EPA extended the comment period until December 1, 2014. This will possibly be our last chance to weigh in and make our voices heard in the halls of the EPA and the Administration. The EPA is expected to issue a final rule in June, 2015.

I am asking for your help as the grass roots of this member-owned cooperative. Enclosed in the pages of Watts Working is a card that allows REMC to contact the EPA on your behalf in opposition to the EPA's proposed greenhouse gas regulations for existing power plants. No postage is required—that's already been taken care of. Please take just a moment to complete the form and drop it in the mail or visit www.Action.coop to send a message electronically.
