
At Randolph EMC, we take great pride in highlighting the value of cooperative membership to young people. After all, they're our members- and leaders-in-training.

### PHP to Share \$10,000 in Grants with Local Non-Profit Agencies

In October, 2014, Randolph EMC's People Helping People (PHP) program received a \$5,000 grant from CoBank's Sharing Success matching grant program. Combined with Randolph EMC's matching \$5,000 donation, PHP has \$10,000 to award to local non-profit 501(c)(3) organizations to help make a positive impact in our home communities.

People Helping People (PHP) is a program that provides financial support to organizations and individuals within the five counties served by Randolph EMC. Money for members is raised by members. Those who wish to participate simply elect to round up their power bills to the nearest dollar each month.

Non-profit agencies in Randolph, Moore, Montgomery, Alamance and Chatham counties are invited to submit proposals to the PHP board for funding up to \$2,000. Grants should be used to implement

### Weather Storms Safely




- Keep several flashlights with extra batteries available. Use extreme caution when using candles or kerosene lamps.
- Have an alternative heating and cooking source available. Take all necessary precautions to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Have a sufficient supply of non-perishable food and drinking water on hand and be sure you have a non-electric can opener.
- Fill the bathtub with water to be used as non-potable water.
- Have a sufficient supply of essential medications and a first aid kit.
- Have a portable battery-operated radio and extra batteries.

- Make plans for the needs of elderly or handicapped family members.
- Have enough cash on hand for a few days and gas up your car.
- Use extreme caution when connecting portable generators. Incorrect installation can lead to accidental electrocution or damaged appliances.
- If you lose power, check your breakers first, then report your outage to 1-877-736-2633. For the fastest response, update your REMC account to list any phone numbers—including cell phones—that might be used to report an outage.
- Always stay away from, and keep others away from, downed power lines!

## #VALUE of ELECTRICITY

Electricity was very valuable to rural homes and farms when introduced by electric cooperatives in the 1930s and 1940s. As technology and efficiency grew along with the demand for electric power, the cost of electricity remained steady. Look at these comparisons.



### AVARE a word about Randolph Electric

#### Dear Members,

"Weather" is a main theme for many of our conversations. The weather is a conversational topic that transcends generational, gender, regional and even nationality gaps. Anytime we feel the need to have a conversation, even with a complete stranger, a safe bet is, "the weather sure is nice today."

There many methods our society uses to predict weather. I've always liked the folklore used by my parents and grandparents. You know them well and can even add to the list:

- Red sky at night, sailor's delight; red sky in morning, sailor take warning.
- A ring around the sun or moon, means rain or snow is coming soon. The number of stars within the ring indicate how many days before bad weather arrives.
- When smoke hovers close to the ground, a weather change is coming round.
- The darker the woolly caterpillar's coat, the more severe the winter will be. If there's a dark stripe at the head and one at the end, the winter will be severe at the beginning, become mild, and then get worse just before spring.
- If you hear thunder in the winter, it will snow within seven days.
- If March comes in like a lion, it will go out like a lamb.

After an intense and exhaustive study to determine which methods provide the most accurate weather forecast, I have narrowed the list down to one standout that is always 100 percent correct. It's the one that

occurs after the event, often referred to as "armchair quarterbacking."

Case in point was the forecasted blizzard and record-breaking snowstorm predicted in late January for New York City. The storm was predicted to be the most intense in New York's history with 24 to 36 inches of snow. In advance of the storm, public transportation was shut down, a travel ban was imposed, hundreds of flights were canceled, and the city's subway system was shut down for the first time in its 110-year history!

Thankfully, the storm track stayed further off the coast and turned out to be just a normal winter event for the city. Boston and other New England areas did receive record amounts of snow, however.

Gary Szatkowski, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service, issued this statement after what was labeled as his "big forecast miss." "My deepest apologies to many key decision makers and so many members of the general public. You made a lot of tough decisions expecting us to get it right, and we didn't. Once again, I'm sorry."

Meteorologists have an extremely difficult job. Sometimes they're right, sometimes they're not.

We have been through some extreme storms together in my thirty years at the cooperative. From hurricanes, like Fran, to ice, snow and wind storms, Randolph EMC has experienced our share through the years.

One prediction that I feel confident in making, though, is that we will



have more storms. And these storms will cause the power to go out.

Keep in mind that just because March has arrived doesn't mean the possibility of a major winter storm event has passed. On March 7, 2014, a heavy ice storm hit the northern section of our service area and 42 percent of members were out of power, some for several days.

You expect us to have a plan in place and be ready to respond when these storms come, even on very short notice. We have a detailed plan that can be activated at a moment's notice, and I want to encourage you to have a plan for you and your family as well.

The National Weather Service has declared March 1st – 7th as Severe Weather Awareness Week in North Carolina. This annual event serves as a reminder for families to prepare for the inevitable. Take a moment to look over our safety tips on page C and use them to help assemble an emergency kit and create an emergency plan to share with each member of your family. After all, the better you are prepared, the easier you will "weather" the storm.
