

Mariah Brown and Lauren Resor attended the Wolfpack Women's Basketball Camp June 14-17 at NC State University in Raleigh. Mariah is the daughter of Rick and Chandra Brown of Bennett. Lauren is the daughter of Mandi Hill of Asheboro.

Brodey King took to the court June 20-24 at the Roy Williams Carolina Basketball Camp at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. Brodey is the son of Angie and Mark King of West End.

"These scholarships are a fantastic way for young athletes to experience life on a college campus and learn from mentors at their favorite NCAA athletic programs," said Lauren Ingold, Public Relations Coordinator at Randolph EMC. "We're proud to continue our tradition of providing outstanding local students with opportunities to develop fundamental skills that will help them excel on the court and in the classroom."

Mariah, Lauren and Brodey earned the all-expense-paid scholarships by completing an application that included academics, community involvement and enthusiasm for sports. Calculate Your Allocation

- Add together all of the energy-related charges from each monthly electric bill you received in 2014.
- Add together the totals from each month's bill obtained in Step 1 to find the total for the year.
- Multiply this total by 0.04003. This will give you the Capital Credits amount allocated to your account for 2014.

Capital Credits Allocated for 2014

Capital Credits are one of the core differences between investor-owned utilities and co-ops. Because members enjoy ownership of the company, each year they receive a share of the co-op's net margins—the amount of money that is left over after paying all expenses for the year. The cooperative refers to these shares as Capital Credits.

Randolph EMC's net margins for Capital Credit allocation totaled \$2,410,503 at the close of 2014. This amount has been disbursed among the Capital Credit accounts of members who had an active electric account during the year. Each member's share is based on a percentage of the \$2,410,503, calculated by how much electricity the member purchased and the rate at which the electric account was billed.

Remember, the check you received in June that included Capital Credits from 2014 only represents a portion of 2014's total allocation.

People Helping People "Shares Success" with 11 Local Non-Profit Agencies

Randolph Electric Membership Corporation's People Helping People (PHP) Program recently awarded \$11,700 to 11 local non-profit agencies as part of a special Community Grants program. Funding for the awards was made possible by money that PHP received from national cooperative lender CoBank's *Sharing Success* matching grant program.

Registered 501(c)(3) organizations in Alamance, Moore, Montgomery, Chatham and Randolph counties were eligible to apply for funding up to \$2,000 to implement programs or purchase needed equipment to facilitate a program that would help make a positive impact in the communities where Randolph EMC member-owners reside.

"All grant applications were carefully reviewed by the People Helping People Board," noted Katherine Brady, President of People Helping People Board of Directors. "It's amazing how many great projects our local non-profits are working on and we are honored to have the opportunity to help make a positive impact in our home communities," she added.

"With such a great need in our communities, the board voted to add a little extra money from our reserves to raise the grants awarded to \$11,700. We are extremely proud to award these grants and know our support will impact

many families, friends and members of the communities that we serve," Brady said.

People Helping People enables members to "round up" their monthly electric bills to the nearest dollar. The extra change goes into the People Helping People account, which is used to provide financial support to individuals and organizations within the five counties served by Randolph EMC. In 2014 alone, People Helping People supported 88 Randolph EMC members totaling \$11,825 in donations.

This is the third year People Helping People has received funding from CoBank's *Sharing Success* matching grant program. In previous years, grants were used to build up the organization's reserves; however, this year's \$5,000 grant, combined with Randolph EMC's matching \$5,000 donation, was earmarked to help non-profit agencies with high-impact projects.

a word about Randolph Electric

Dear Members,

Well, it is that time of the year again. For the hurricane season, which officially runs from June 1–November 30, NOAA is predicting a 70 percent likelihood of 6 to 11 named storms (winds of 39 mph or higher), of which 3 to 6 could become hurricanes (winds of 74 mph or higher), including zero to 2 major hurricanes (Category 3, 4 or 5; winds of 111 mph or higher). While a below-normal season is likely (70 percent), there is also a 20 percent chance of a near-normal season, and a 10 percent chance of an above-normal season.

Sometimes, unless we are directly affected, it is hard to comprehend what others go through when a major weather event strikes an area. Our memories are relatively short. When we reflect back to Hurricanes Hugo, Fran and Floyd, we are reminded of the severe damage that a widespread, intense storm can cause. We are also reminded that, even though we live in central North Carolina, we can still feel the impact of hurricanes.

Being as prepared as possible is the key. Here are a few suggestions for disaster supplies to have on hand and preparations to make before a hurricane or major storm arrives.

- Have a kit with the following items readily accessible:
 - Several flashlights with extra batteries
 - Portable battery operated radio and extra batteries
 - Solar-powered chargers for mobile devices
 - First Aid Kit
 - Sufficient supply of non-perishable food & drinking water
 - Non-electric can opener
 - Sufficient supply of essential medications
 - Enough cash to use for a few days
- Fill the bathtub with water to be used as non-potable water.
- Fill up all vehicles with gas.
- Take necessary precautions for pets.
- Plan early for family members with special needs.

 Check often for official weather bulletins.
 Download the free weather



alert app available from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) for your mobile device or keep a NOAA Weather Radio with battery backup to receive alerts and warnings.

- Know the location of your nearest storm shelter.
- Secure lawn furniture and other objects susceptible to wind found in and around your yard.
- Use extreme caution when connecting portable generators. Incorrect installation can lead to accidental electrocution or damaged appliances.
- Inventory your property. A list of items and photos will help with any insurance claims.

I encourage you to visit *Ready.gov* for a comprehensive guide on how to prepare for storms and other disasters. This site is designed to educate and empower Americans to prepare for and respond to various emergencies. In addition, if you have a power outage, report it to 1-877-736-2633 and always stay away and keep others away from downed power lines!

I commit to you that Randolph EMC will be as prepared as possible in the event a major hurricane comes our way this year. I ask you to do your part for your family and take these suggestions to heart. They will help you and your family safely "weather the storm."
