\$2.5 Million in Capital Credits **Returned to Members in June**

Putting money back into members' pockets with Capital Credits is just one unique difference that sets Randolph Electric apart from investor-owned utilities. This year, the Randolph EMC Board of Directors authorized a general retirement of \$2.5 million, with this year's estate retirements estimated at \$530,000. That's a total of more than \$3 million that's flowing back to our members and into the local economy in the five counties we serve.

This retirement will return 97 percent of the remaining patronage capital from 1993, and 31 percent of 2016's capital credits allocation.

As a cooperative business, Randolph Electric doesn't earn profits. Instead, any revenues remaining after all expenses have been paid each year are considered "margins." They are returned to the members after being used for a period of years as capital to help financemajor long-term reliability projects, including substations and power lines and poles.

Each year, the Board of Directors decides on a capital credit retirement based on the financial health of the cooperative. The amount of capital

credits allocated to a member's account is based upon the amount of capital they contribute to the cooperative through payment of their monthly bills. The more electricity a member buys, the greater their capital credit allocation. Capital credits are allocated on a continuous cycle: the cooperative collects for current needs to deliver reliable electricity while returning funds collected in previous years. This helps offset the need to borrow funds, thereby helping keep your electricity rates lower.

Capital credit checks were mailed out to members in early June. Refund amounts less than \$20 were issued as a bill credit.

Randolph EMC Provides Zero-Interest Loan to Robbins Fire & Rescue

You've probably seen a new, shiny fire engine, loaded with the newest upgrades in fire safety and technology rushing throughout the Town of Robbins recently. This new truck purchase was made possible by a \$360,000 zero-interest loan from Randolph EMC back in April.

Randolph Electric was able to extend the loan through its Economic Development Revolving Loan Fund. The fund was established by way of the Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant (REDLG) program administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). The program provides zero-interest loans and grants to local electric cooperatives, that, in turn, lend the money to qualifying recipients for projects in support of community and economic development in rural areas.

"The USDA's REDLG program is part of Randolph EMC's mission to support the communities we serve," said Steve Harris, who serves as REMC's District 8 Board of Directors. "As a member-owned cooperative, we are proud to be able to provide financial support for the purchase of equipment that will enhance the safety and well-being of not only those we serve, but the entire community served by Robbins Fire and Rescue Department.

The Robbins Fire and Rescue Department provides its surrounding community with fire and rescue services with a primary station located at 301 Branson Circle in Robbins. The department responded to 636 emergency calls in 2016. Fires accounted for 254 of the calls, while 382 were rescue or medical calls.

The new fire truck is decked out with the most advanced supplies and tools to more efficiently and safely help first responders during emergencies. The new engine can easily hold six firefighters, comfortably. Chief Jarius Garner says five of the six seats are equipped with mounts for self-contained breathing apparatuses, or "air packs." "The air pack seats make it possible for firefighters to make quick fire attacks on arrival," he said.

"Robbins Fire and Rescue is fully equipped to respond in any emergency situation and we are lucky to have a station with such new technological advancements in Moore County," said Jay Albright, who serves as Randolph Electric's District Vice President. Once repaid, the funds loaned by Randolph Electric will be re-loaned to assist with future projects in the cooperative's service area.



Set Up Alert Notifications to Avoid Unwanted 'Surprises' on Bills

Did you know that you can set up alert notifications to make you aware of high usage on your account? Our High Energy Usage Alert could come in handy if you have a heat pump, well pump or water heater malfunction that could drastically increase your monthly electric bill. No one wants a surprise like that!

If high usage alert notifications are received consistently for a few days, and seasonal temperature fluctuations can be ruled out, you might need to investigate further.

To set up alert notifications, simply login to your account at RandolphEMC.com and navigate to the My Alerts tab. Make sure your contact information is correct, then enter a dollar amount for your high usage threshold next to High Usage Alert. Submit your information and you'll now be notified when your daily usage is higher than the amount you specified!
